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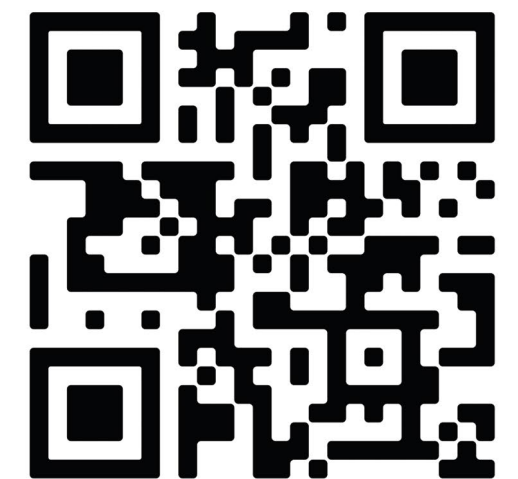
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'An honour' - KGA soldier reflects on why the Gurkha Artillery Regiment's historic formation is important for him - and us all.

“I was deployed on Operation Scorpius in Poland when I heard the news – news that would be a defining moment in my Army career.

I had been selected to join the first Artillery Regiment in the history of the Brigade of Gurkhas - The King's Gurkha Artillery.

And as I found myself standing at the cap-badging ceremony alongside 80 others, I was incredibly proud, because it signified not only our formal transition into the KGA, but also the birth of a regiment that stands for adaptability, professionalism and that, I know, will support the enduring legacy of Gurkha soldiers.

Leaving my former regiment, The Queen's Own Gurkha Logistic Regiment, was not an easy decision. I had spent the past three years there, developing myself and forming the foundations of my military career.

However, when the opportunity to join KGA arose, I knew straight away it was something I wanted. The chance to take on a new challenge - and contribute to a historic formation - made it irresistible.

I began with a two-week induction package which prepared me for life in the artillery and familiarised me with the regiment's history, system, procedures and routines.

This was followed by the Driver Signaller Course and the level 2 Gunner Command System Course, since I am ACS by trade. These gave me the knowledge and skills needed to operate effectively in the Royal Artillery. Learning new systems and procedures was challenging, but the professionalism and support of instructors and fellow soldiers made the transition both manageable and rewarding.

Unforgettable

After training, I deployed to Sennybridge Training Area on my first ever artillery exercise, Combined Warrior 2025. It was a landmark moment, featuring the King's Gurkha Artillery's first ever live fire mission. As a Signaller, I supported artillery activity from the command post ensuring accurate and timely

transmission of fire orders between forward observers and the gun line. I also learned how to set up a command post tactically and rapidly in harsh conditions, adding a hands-on dimension to my training.

Hearing the loud bang of light gun fire during my first fire mission was unforgettable.

Later in the year, I was honoured to be selected to join the gold-winning KGA team on Exercise Cambrian Patrol, one of the toughest and most prestigious international patrolling exercises. Securing the gold medal was an historic achievement for the regiment and set a benchmark of professionalism, discipline and hard work for future KGA teams.

Growing legacy

I have since completed my Gunner to Lance Bombardier ALDP course and returned from another Exercise Combined Warrior, which further built my confidence and experience.

With each deployment my understanding of artillery procedures and ability to contribute effectively within the regiment grows.

I am now preparing and looking forward to the Advanced Signaller and Level 3 Gunner Command System Course - important steps towards becoming fully qualified at my rank and strengthening my skills in support of the KGA and the Royal Artillery.

The transition into the artillery regiment has been smooth and professionally rewarding. Working alongside British soldiers - learning from one another, supporting each other, and upholding Gurkha traditions - has really strengthened cohesion. I'm grateful to all the instructors and soldiers whose guidance has helped us learn our trade.

I'm proud to be part of the early days of the King's Gurkha Artillery. From the cap badge presentation to courses, live fire training and major exercises, each step has reinforced my belief in the regiment's future.

It's an honour to serve right from the beginning - contribute to a wonderful growing legacy. ”

Gunner voices: Untold Artillery stories forever preserved

In 2019 the Royal Artillery Museum interviewed Captain Leslie Gosling, who recalled his time serving at the Battle of El Alamein. A clip of this was used in the Master Gunner's El Alamein Day Broadcast that year. Realising the importance of capturing more stories like this, the Royal Artillery Museum launched an Oral History Project with the aim of recording the memories and experiences of the Gunner family in conflict and in military life.

Spearheaded by one of the Royal Artillery Museum's enthusiastic volunteers, the project began to take shape in 2020. With advice from the BFBS, our volunteers were able to complete a series of video interviews covering experiences from Normandy to

Bosnia, recalling time spent in National Service, the BAOR, and Korea. While that initial stage of the project focused heavily on the memories of Gunners from World War II up to the 1960s, we were also able to record recollections from serving members of King's Troop about their role in the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II.

Speaking to the Royal Artillery Museum about his experience of serving in Korea, Brigadier Brian Parritt recounted one memorable story from the Battle of the Hook in 1953. Located in an area of tactical and strategic importance, when the battle commenced, the order was given for continuous fire. Arriving with extra ammunition, one officer from the RASC – a friend of Brian's from Sandhurst



– saw that the guns were red hot. He leapt from his cab, dunked his towel in a bucket of water and threw it over the barrel. The metal was so hot from the constant barrage that the towel burst into flames. A few weeks later in the officer's mess, the Gunners, including Brian, presented him with a bottle of whiskey and a new green towel!

Among other interviews, we were fortunate to chat with Francis Goode, who served with 4 (Durham) Survey

Regiment in Normandy, as well as Molly Clarke and Grace Taylor, who shared their experiences serving alongside the Royal Artillery as part of the ATS during World War II. Sadly, both Francis and Molly have since passed away. Grace celebrated her 100th birthday last year.

The Oral History Project was badly disrupted by the pandemic between 2020 and 2022, but is back on track thanks to the continued support of the Royal Artillery Heritage Committee. With funding from the Royal Artillery Institution, the Museum has been able to employ a part time Archive Assistant whose main role is to work on the project. Ali Stump joined the team at the start of 2025, having previously worked in the archive at the Science Museum's National Collections Centre.

While we are still keen to hear from Gunners with experiences prior to 1960, as the project progresses we will be seeking to interview those who have served in more recent conflicts as well as capturing a range of other stories from the lives of today's Gunners and their families.

We have also started editing the full length interviews to create video shorts, for use on our website and social media channels. We hope they can also be used in future museum displays to help bring the story of the Royal Artillery to life.

In recording these video interviews, the Royal Artillery Museum aims to build an oral history archive that can be used for research, education, and public engagement, that covers many of the operations, theatres and Garrisons in which Gunners of every rank have served.

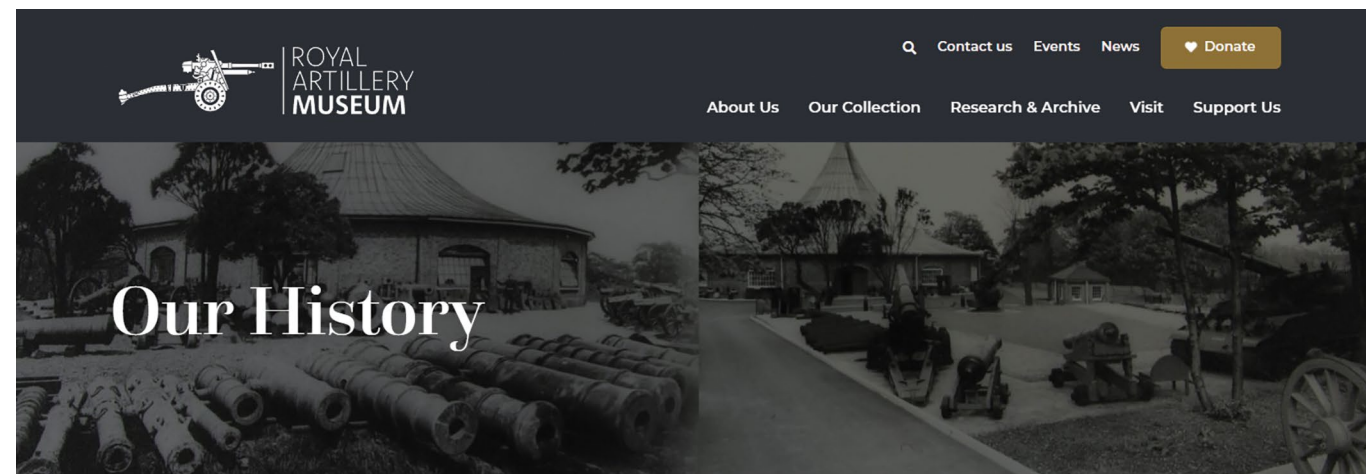

The Royal Artillery Museum is one of the world's oldest military museums. It first opened to the public in 1820, but the collection is even older than that.

The Royal Military Repository

In 1778, King George III instructed Lord Townshend, the Master-General of the Ordnance, to establish a "Repository for Military Machines" to provide the officers and soldiers of the Royal Artillery with improved training in the science and practice of artillery.

Naked and Afraid: Apocalypse



WO2 Steven Kelly

A 29 Commando Gunner took Royal Artillery grit to Discovery Channel's toughest TV show.

WO2 Steven "Ste" Kelly appeared on *Naked and Afraid: Apocalypse*. No kit, no comfort—just fieldcraft, teamwork and attitude. Here's how a green beret Gunner applied soldiering fundamentals to survive on camera and why it matters to the Regiment.

"Out there, I had nothing"

When *Naked and Afraid: Apocalypse* dropped contestants into South Africa's abandoned spaces, WO2 Steven Kelly

swapped Bergan and bashas for the bare minimum: a blade, a fire kit and his head. "On ops you've got logistics and redundancy. Here, you've only got judgement," he says. The shock wasn't the heat or the bites—it was the silence between decisions. That head game is where Commando training pays off: routine under fatigue, humour under stress, and rapid risk assessment when resources are thin.

The challenge: survive, move, overcome

The format is brutal: no food, no water, no clothing, and no guaranteed extraction. Teams must scavenge, build shelter, purify water and



navigate to safety across hazardous ground—glass, rust, thorns, predators and heat. It's not a scenic hike; it's a rolling SERE style puzzle. For Kelly, Day 1 looked like this: site recce, triage tasks, set a water plan before sundown, build heat management into movement, then protect rest. "You can bluff a camera. You can't bluff dehydration," he notes.

Why this is a Gunner story

Commando Gunners are selected for adaptability. Earning the green beret via AACC proves you can think clearly when cold, wet, tired—and the clock keeps running. That habit travelled well to TV: self discipline, initiative, courage, and the ability to laugh when morale is thin. It's Ubique made visible—anywhere, by whatever route duty and glory lead.

The Commando transfer: soldiering that scales to survival

- **Basics always:** Weapon becomes blade; ammo becomes water. The drill remains: service it, protect it, account for it.
- **Navigation on low calories:** Micro check bearings, pace sensibly, and aim off to features you can actually hit. Poor nav is an energy leak.
- **Team before self:** Task allocation—fire, water, shelter, security—beats solo heroics. The best camp is a system, not a stunt.
- **Mindset wins days:** Routine (morning checks, evening admin) and humour keep the team cohesive and decision fit.

Lessons for the Regiment

- **Resilience is trained, not gifted.** Controlled discomfort from AACC inoculates against shock when variables explode.
- **Fieldcraft is a force multiplier.** Fire craft, water sourcing and shelter selection turn "nothing" into margin.
- **Narrative matters.** British soldiers showing Values & Standards on global

platforms shapes public understanding of soldiering in 2025.

A word on risk

Television compresses days of graft into minutes. The invisible work is dozens of micro decisions: where to sit to reduce snake strike angles; when to carry embers vs rebuild; how to ration calories against nav legs; how hygiene routines prevent day ending infections. That quiet judgement is what we train—thinking under fatigue.

Why it resonates with Gunners

Artillery is systems thinking. Survival is a system too: inputs (water, calories, heat), processes (movement, security, hygiene), outputs (people who can move tomorrow). Kelly's stint shows that clear thinking under constraint—our bread and butter—travels from gun line to bush line.

Commando Gunner 101 (for families & new readers)

Who? 29 Commando Regiment RA—green beret Gunners supporting Commando Forces.

How? Pass the All Arms Commando Course at CTCRM Lympstone; earn the green beret.

Why? To deliver artillery effects with amphibious and littoral flexibility.

Kit you wish you had (but learn to live without)

- Stove > ember & patience (hand /bow drill only works if your tinder prep is gold)
- CamelBak > purification on repeat (fetch > filter > boil/treat > protect)
- Basha > terrain led shelter (wind/heat/insects dictate design)
- MED pack > preventive medicine (hygiene beats heroics when resupply = zero)

Footsteps of history: Learning lessons from D-Day and beyond in Normandy



Normandy Memorial

As part of the Troop Commander Module, the Young Officers (YOs) deployed in October, on Ex YOUNG LIONS, a Battlefield Study to Normandy. The study involved the YOs presenting on a variety of topics and planning problems faced by both Allied and German forces. The YOs applied lessons learnt from the early stages of Operation OVERLORD to modern conflicts, discussing the development of assets and doctrine.

The Exercise commenced at Pegasus bridge after a visit to a local boulangerie, which gave us the opportunity to explore the town and situate ourselves to the study. With Pegasus Bridge looming behind us we began our first stand. As part of Operation DEADSTICK the mission was: 'to capture and seize two bridges over the Caen Canal'. The success

of the mission was largely down to the credible intelligence provided by members of the French Resistance. The Gondrée family were instrumental in exposing the location of the German demolition charges highlighting the enemy's intent of denying the Allies' use of the Bridge. The intelligence stressed the importance of momentum in the assault, as capturing the bridge intact was critical to the Allied advance. Rehearsals were equally as crucial to the success of the mission and are particularly relevant today, given the complexity of modern conflicts. We discussed the low-level training and rehearsals and its relevance to us as Troop Commanders, considering the importance of mission command. Aerial photos proved invaluable to the planning of the mission. The combination of these photos, coupled with pre-invasion planning enabled one of



the most successful glider operations of the war.

The developing aerial reconnaissance capability had its limitations with the US Rangers, led by Lt Col. James Rudder, being misled at Omaha Beach. They believed that gun and heavy artillery positions would be found in the encasements at the top of the cliffs. In the run up to D-Day, however, German forces had become aware of the Allies' knowledge of the gun locations, and as such chose to move to alternate positions over a mile inland. The lack of real-time information proved costly and following the successful capture of the cliff top, the Rangers faced ongoing German counterattacks until they could be relieved by troops from Omaha Beach. At Pointe du Hoc, we considered how the application of modern ISTAR capabilities and the potential co-ordination of Naval Gunfire could have aided the mission. In particular, we discussed whether Naval gunfire would have been a help or hinderance, which segued neatly into a lesson on Battlespace Management and Interoperability, and its importance to us as Gunner Officers.

Innovation was vital in the planning and execution of Op OVERLORD. At Arromanches and the Sexton memorial near Gold Beach, we examined various areas of innovation from Logistics to Hobart's Funnies tanks. After the failed raid at the Port of Dieppe in 1942, a clear solution was vital to the Allies in how to provide the invasion force with reinforcements and supplies without incurring heavy losses. The largest part of Mulberry Harbour B, 'Port Winston', is still

visible from Arromanches. This provided a fitting setting to discuss how the Allies overcame the problem of capturing a port. We talked about the importance of Logistics in enabling future operations and considered how their importance is often overlooked in modern contexts. This is particularly pertinent to us as Troop Commanders in considering the immense burden artillery systems can put on supply chains, highlighting the need to liaise with different capabilities. Equally, we discussed the importance innovative Logistics in order to enable operations.



Le Grande Bunker

In relation to German defences and the utilisation of Artillery in defence, we



visited Longues-sur Mer Battery and Le Grande Bunker. Two key sites of the Atlantic Wall, they offered both varied past lessons and modern considerations. Le Grande Bunker served as a former Command and Fire Direction Post, converted from a French Naval Blockhouse. Here, we explored the museum with its fantastic views across the channel and arcs across the D-Day landing beaches. With modern conflicts focussing on Urban Operations, Le Grande Bunker served as a prominent site for us to consider how to conceal in urban settings.

At Longues-sur Mer, one of our penultimate sites of the Exercise, we studied how Field Marshal Rommel prepared the Atlantic Wall for the Allied invasion. Centred around defensive operations, we heard of the significant challenges the Wall faced with its lack of resources and the limited timeline given for such an ambitious tasking. We looked at how stretched the defensive line was and how Allied deception had led to the heavy fortification further North at Pas-de-Calais. In an era of increasing misinformation, this left much food for thought in undertaking defensive operations in the modern context.

Our final presentation led us to the Château de Caen, situated in the centre of the city where Allied bombing on D-Day caused devastating numbers of civilian casualties. The view from the Château provided the backdrop for a poignant presentation on the Law of Armed Conflict and the realities of war. A topic that is still as relevant today, the bombing of Caen highlighted the consideration of collateral damage versus military necessity.

We focused on the impact that Artillery has had both historically and its potential future application, considering the current effects Artillery is having in current conflicts.

The Exercise included tours of poignant memorials and cemeteries, bringing to life the realities of war. We compared the stark architectural differences between the Allied cemeteries, looking at the reflection pools at the American cemetery above Omaha Beach and the bright colours of the British cemetery at Bayeux. The tours provided a solemn moment of reflection, concluding with the Master Gunner laying a wreath at the cemetery in Bayeux.

The Exercise was not without fantastic hospitality provided at the Château du Perron, and equally delightful restaurants around Normandy. This was a highly informative Exercise, bringing past lessons into the present giving the YOs much to consider as we embark on our future careers. Our sincere thanks to all the staff for making the Exercise possible.

Back in barracks: Veteran's surprise return to his artillery home

National Service in the United Kingdom was a period of mandatory military conscription for men introduced after World War II, running from 1949 to 1963, requiring them to serve 18-24 months in the armed forces. It resolved post-war workforce shortages and became a significant social experience for over two million men (c1.1 million served in the Army)

In November 1957, after a brief period at 67 Training Regiment, Royal Artillery at Oswestry in Shropshire to be kitted out and taught the rudiments of foot-drill (square-bashing using the language of the day), Newly conscripted National Serviceman, Gunner Eric Bebb, having seen other newly mustered Gunners sent off to join Garrisons in the British Army Of the Rhine (BAOR)

in Germany and some to exotic climes such as Hong-Kong, received his posting order to sunny Roberts Barracks Larkhill to join 52 Locating Regiment, Royal Artillery as a locator.

Eric recalls not long after arriving in 22 (Gibraltar) Locating Battery, his being sent to Woolwich to learn to become a Battery Clerk and although his discharge papers show his trade as a B3 Clerk, he admitted that his tour in the Battery Office was short lived after his letter to a bank where he had referred to 'receipt of a check'. That wouldn't do at all said the Battery Commander and thereafter, Eric was exiled to the Ration Store until his demob in November 1959 where he recalls having had a wonderful 2 years; close to the rations, entrusted to drive



a truck around the country collecting rations and stores, promoting to Lance-Bombardier and avoiding exercises and parades.

Eric recounted these and other tales to his family down the years and with his 90th Birthday looming on the 30th of October, one of Eric's daughters got in contact with the Garrison to enquire if her Dad might visit the Barracks again as they would be in the area visiting from their homes in Wales for the occasion.

Fast forward a week and the Garrison Management Team arranged for Eric and his daughters Ruth and Kath to be met at the gate on his birthday and shown around the newest side of the Garrison in the west briefly before repairing to the Royal Artillery Mess for a delicious late lunch and some birthday cake complete with singing!

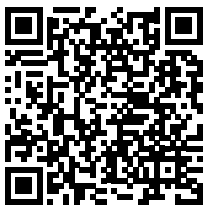
During the lunch, Eric and his daughters were very taken aback by the splendour of the Mess that the staff had presented in all its sparkling glory and, after lunch, Colonel Peter Thompson, the Mess Secretary gave the party an excellent talk on the history of the Mess and its Silver Collection over a coffee.

Thanks and farewells and then back on the transport to complete the 'windscreen tour' of the Garrison and try and find a surviving building in Roberts Barracks from Eric's time there. Having positioned the transport at the former entrance to Roberts Barracks along the Packway which now comes to an abrupt stop at the new fence line, a glimmer of recognition came over Eric's eyes as he saw the relative positions of the former Henge Arms and the remnants of the Regimental Square as he could recall them from those short 66 years ago.

Eric and his daughters were then delivered back to their car and after final thanks from the family for the hosting and the Garrison Management Team for being given the opportunity to be part of Eric's Birthday celebrations, Eric left with yet more good memories of his time at Larkhill.

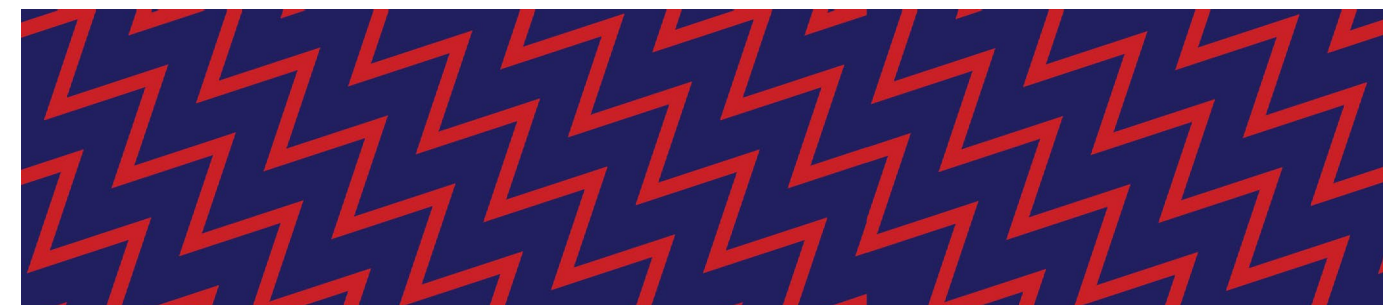

Brigadier John Bettridge CBE



Soldier - Principal of the Emergency Planning College and Mental Health Campaigner

John liked to tell how his military career got off to a somewhat slow start. Serving in the ranks for his first year of national service in 1950, he was recommended for promotion to lance bombardier only to be told later that his battery commander had changed his mind. A few months later at the War Office Selection Board for national service commissions he was told by the colonel who chaired the Board "Bettridge, I have been looking forward to meeting you because you are the first fruit porter and packer who has applied for a commission" (John had worked for a few months in a fruit packing firm after leaving grammar school before being called up

and this was noted as his trade on enlistment). He failed that Board but a few months later passed at a second attempt. He subsequently passed out top of his officer training intake and was posted to 4 RHA for the remainder of his national service.

After a spell trying several jobs in civilian life, John was granted a regular commission. A period of regimental duty followed including a tour with 3 RHA in Libya at the time of the Suez crisis. He married Margaret Brimble in 1959 and soon afterwards became an instructor at Sandhurst. He attended the Staff College in 1962. After further regimental duty, a staff job in the War Office and command of E Battery in 1 RHA, John and his family spent six months in Norfolk Virginia where he attended the US Armed Forces Staff College before moving to Canada for two years to become the UK exchange instructor at the Canadian Army Staff College in Kingston.

After Canada, he commanded 3 RHA in Hong Kong – he saw the opportunity to command this fine regiment in such an exciting place – as a great privilege. A spell as Chief Instructor

Tactics at Larkhill followed, after which he became CRA of 2nd Division in Germany and from there attended the one-year course at the Royal College of Defence Studies in Belgrave Square. In 1980 he became Deputy Commandant of the Staff College and at the end of his tour in 1983 was appointed CBE.

His last Army appointment was Commandant RSA. In 1983 the UK was invited to send a delegation to China to discuss artillery weapons and their future. John as Commandant RSA led the delegation. On arrival in China, he and his colleagues were intrigued to learn that one of their presentations would be attended by no fewer than sixty generals.

John was a keen games player. He captained the Army cricket team in Hong Kong and was an enthusiastic social golfer. Throughout his service he was keen to encourage others to take advantage of the excellent sporting and outward-bound activities the Army offered.

He left the Army in 1984 to become Principal of the Home Office Civil Defence College (near York) and the national Co-ordinator of Voluntary Effort



in Civil Defence. Towards the end of the Cold War, he was given the challenging task of changing the College into the Home Office's Emergency Planning College with a view to improving the coordination of the national response to major disasters and civil emergencies. During this time, he played an important part in developing a network of the heads of similar colleges around the world which proved useful in helping to share expertise and good practice in emergency planning.

On retiring after 11 years as Principal, John was keen to do something completely different and having always been interested in woodwork, he attended courses in cabinet making and furniture restoration and did many projects for family and friends. Towards the end of his courses, he was encouraged by his instructors to enter a national competition for furniture restoration to be judged by an expert from the Antiques Road Show. John was proud of winning fifth prize although when pressed, he was prepared to admit that only five people had entered!

His organising skills, his sense of humour coupled with

a remarkable ability to get on with all sorts of people, stood him in good stead when he subsequently became involved in helping to improve mental health services and care in York. He ran a mental health charity for several years and was in great demand as chair of various mental health boards, committees and working groups.

Towards the end of his time in York, as Voluntary Coordinator of the York branch of Rethink Mental Illness, he did a great deal to help carers of people with severe mental ill health deal with the daunting challenges they faced. This work included bringing carers together to support each other, to discuss coping strategies and give carers a voice in the development of national and local mental health policy.

In 2019 John, his wife Margaret and son, moved to Cornwall to be closer to their family. When Margaret was diagnosed with dementia in 2020, John became her principal carer.

John died on 18 November. He is survived by Margaret and their daughter and son.

Muddy Boots

When the war was over, they stood in the quiet fields no orders, no echoes, only the sound of wind learning their names again.

Their bergens lay heavy in the mud, stitched with years of fear and dust, each strap a memory of someone who never made it to the morning. And then one by one they slipped them off, like shedding the skin of another life.

Boots unlaced, mud crusted, soul worn, they sank to the earth and felt its forgiveness rising through their soles. The weight of miles fell away, and their feet, raw and real again, touched grass that hadn't known blood.

Some wept. Some laughed like children who'd forgotten the tune of joy.

The sky did not salute them it simply opened blue, indifferent, mercifully ordinary.

They carried nothing now but silence, and the faint trembling of hearts relearning how to beat for something other than survival. And somewhere, deep in the dirt, their footprints ended and began again.

Granddaughter of Andrew Michael Walker who served 22 years in The King's Troop Royal Horse Artillery as a Bombardier.



Lieutenant Colonel (Retd) Michael Stanley Head 1932-2025



Michael, or Mike (as he was known to many) was born in Brighton on 15th November 1932. He was the fifth child of eleven, with five brothers and five sisters. He was evacuated during the second world war with his brother Peter to South Elmsall, a mining village in South Yorkshire.

On returning home and after leaving school he tried his hand at French polishing and theatre lighting but saw a recruitment advertisement for the Army and despite his Father's best efforts to persuade him otherwise, began his Boys' Service in the Royal Artillery on 2nd June 1948 aged 15. Mike loved the Army and flourished there. He was a talented and successful sportsman for the Army in both football and track and field. His early Army career took him to the Middle and Far East

(Aden, Singapore and Hong Kong), and to various locations in the UK. Later he was posted to BAOR in Germany and in common with his peers he also completed several Op BANNER tours in Northern Ireland in the early 1970s.

He was commissioned in 1974, joining 36 Heavy Air Defence Regiment in Dortmund, followed by Quartermaster appointments in 12 Light Air Defence Regiment and 26 Field Regiment, also in Dortmund. He returned to the UK in 1983 to 32 Guided Weapons Regiment in Bulford and ended his regular service in 1987 as QM of 14 Field Regiment in Larkhill.

Mike resisted the urge to put his feet up and assumed a Retired Officer appointment as Commandant Camps on Salisbury Plain Training area until his "second" retirement in 1997.

Mike met his future wife Marianne when stationed in Haan, near Wuppertal and they married in 1964, welcoming their daughter, Roberta, in 1967. Marianne died in 2002 and Mike spent the rest of his life living alone. He missed Marianne terribly but found solace in playing golf and

walking Harvey, his much loved Welsh Springer Spaniel. He also learned to cook and continued to work mainly on a voluntary basis, supporting societies at Tidworth Golf Club and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Charity. He continued to play golf into his very late eighties and power walking for as long as he was able. He became increasingly frail in his last months but remained determined to stay in his own home – which he succeeded in doing. He suffered a significant fall on 3rd October from which he could not recover, and he died peacefully at the Countess of Brecknock hospice in Andover on 6th October. A private service was held at Charlton Crematorium on the 29th October, followed by a gathering to celebrate his life at Tidworth Golf Club. His ashes will be interred alongside Marianne in Germany next year.

He is survived by his daughter.

YOUNG OFFICERS' BRANCH CENTENARY DINNER

The first of a long series of young officers courses assembled at the School of Artillery on 2nd February 1926 under the command of Maj Wyndham Greene DSO MC, assisted by Maj Ambrose Pratt MC. 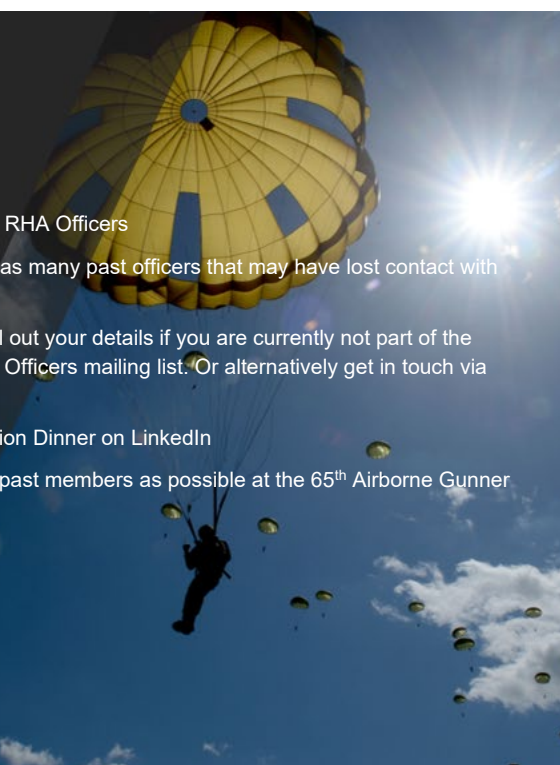


